Notice of intention to apply for marine reserves on the southeast coast of the South Island

In May 2019, the Ministers of Conservation and Fisheries announced that statutory processes would begin to establish six marine reserves under the Marine Reserves Act 1971 and five Type 2 marine protected areas and a kelp harvesting prohibition area under the Fisheries Act 1996. Together, these would create marine protected areas on the southeastern coast of the South Island similar to network 1 as recommended by the South-East Marine Protection Forum Roopu Manaaki ki te Toka. The identification system used by the forum (e.g. B1) alongside the proposed name of each marine reserve is provided below.

Pursuant to section 5 of the Marine Reserves Act 1971 and section 48 of the Marine and Coastal Area (Takutai Moana) Act 2011, the Director-General of Conservation hereby gives notice of his intention to apply for an Order in Council declaring marine reserves in six areas of sea and foreshore in the southeast South Island, with their proposed names, as follows:

- Waitaki Marine Reserve (B1).** The proposed marine reserve boundary starts approximately 2 km south of the Waitaki River mouth and extends south for 14.8 km (8 NM). The site includes the coastal marine area from MHWs and extends offshore 8 km (4.3 NM). Area: 101.3 km².
- Te Umu Koau Marine Reserve (D1).** The proposed marine reserve boundary starts approximately 100 m north of the mouth of Stony Creek and extends south to a point approximately 400 m south of the mouth of Pleasant River. It includes Bobbys Head and the entirety of Stony Creek and Pleasant River estuaries. The reserve extends from MHWs to a straight line outer boundary that ranges between 10 km and 12 km offshore. Area: 96 km².
- Papanui Marine Reserve (H1).** The proposed marine reserve boundary starts approximately 6 km out from Cape Saunders and extends north approximately 11 km. It then extends to the 12 NM territorial sea limit, incorporating Papanui Canyon. Area: 167 km².
- Ōrau Marine Reserve (I1).** The proposed marine reserve boundary extends from Haraakeke Point on the Otago Peninsula 17.8 km to the outer point of Saint Clair. It includes Lawyers Head, Māori Head, Seal Point and the waters surrounding Gull Rocks from MHWs. The seaward boundary extends from Haraakeke Point to approximately 1 km to the south of the breaking reef to the west of Pouitahine (White Island). The area does not include Tow Rock. Area: 28.8 km².
- Okaihae Marine Reserve (K1).** The proposed marine reserve encompasses Okaihae/Green Island, extending approximately 1 km to the north, west and east of the island, and 1.3 km to the south. Area: 5 km².
- Hākinikini Marine Reserve (M1).** The proposed marine reserve boundary begins approximately 0.8 km north of the entrance to Akatore Creek and extends south along the coastline for approximately 6.5 km to the northern point of Watsons Beach. It extends from MHWs to approximately 0.6 to 1.5 km offshore. Area: 5.9 km².

Note: Fisheries New Zealand is concurrently running a consultation process on five proposed Type 2 marine protected areas and a kelp harvesting prohibition in the same area (all using the Fisheries Act). The consultation document contains maps and information about these proposed areas.

Any person, whānau, hapū or iwi or organisation who wishes to object to Orders in Council being made that establish the marine reserves, may do so by specifying the grounds of the objection in writing and submitting them to the Director-General of Conservation using the website above. If you are unable to provide an online submission, you can mail it to the address below.

Under the Marine and Coastal Area (Takutai Moana) Act 2011, any whānau, hapū or iwi exercising kaitiakitanga in a part of the common marine and coastal area affected by the proposed reserves, have a right to participate in the process and provide their views. The Minister of Conservation must have particular regard to the views of affected whānau, hapū and iwi when considering the proposed reserves. To exercise that right, whānau, hapū or iwi who exercise kaitiakitanga in a part of the common marine and coastal area covered by the marine reserve proposals must advise the Director-General of Conservation that they are affected and provide their views on those proposals using the website above. If you are unable to provide an online submission, you can mail it to the address below. All objections, submissions and advice must be provided by 17 April 2020 (being two months from the date of first publication of this notice) — 17 February 2020.

Notice of intention to apply for marine reserves on the southeast coast of the South Island - Recommendation of Public Consultation

Public consultation on proposed marine reserves was initiated on 17 February 2020 and withdrawn on 9 April 2020 due to New Zealand's emergency response to the global COVID-19 pandemic. The Department of Conservation is now recommencing public consultation and invites public feedback on the proposed marine reserves, which are unchanged from those consulted on in February 2020. Full details are provided below.

In May 2019, the Ministers of Conservation and Fisheries announced that statutory processes would begin to establish six marine reserves under the Marine Reserves Act 1971 and five Type 2 marine protected areas and a kelp harvesting prohibition area under the Fisheries Act 1996. Together, these would create marine protected areas on the southeastern coast of the South Island similar to network 1 as recommended by the South-East Marine Protection Forum Roopu Manaaki ki te Toka. The identification system used by the forum (e.g. B1) alongside the proposed name of each marine reserve is provided below.

Leave Wallabies to Rennie: Cheika

Rugby

Australia's director of rugby Scott Johnson should take a step back and let incoming Wallabies coach Dave Rennie be the boss of the team when he begins work.

That's the view of former Wallabies coach Michael Cheika, who has strongly urged Rugby Australia to ensure Rennie is the man at the top of the food chain and not Johnson.

Cheika had his power diminished at the end of 2018 when the RA board appointed Johnson to be Australia's director of rugby following a year which saw Australia win four of 13 tests.

A third selector in former dual international Michael O'Connor also came on board but the structural changes were never well-received by Cheika.

Cheika did not like the fact he had to report to Johnson and, according to O'Connor in a recent interview with the *Sydney Morning Herald*, said he was all but a one-man show in selection meetings - a claim Cheika refutes.

Rennie, a two-time Super Rugby title-winning coach with the Chiefs, formally started this week with RA but is yet to arrive in Australia.

Speaking on an Instagram live video with former Wallabies great David Campese, Cheika said he wanted to see Rennie given full responsibility for the team.

"I'm personally not a fan of the whole director of rugby concept, whether it be in club or at national [level], and I think that Dave Rennie, when he comes in, he should be the boss," Cheika said.

"There's only one boss in a footy team. The organisation should trust him to run the football. That's no disrespect to the other gent [Johnson]. It's not a personal issue.

"That doesn't mean he's a totalitarian dictator. He can have advice and he's got good staff around him but the accountability factor. It's much easier to align a group with a chairman, CEO, coach, captain... obviously the less number of people in there the less ways to go around it.

"The new coach has a lot of experience so I think they should trust him to be able to run the show."

Cheika was also asked by Campese about reports of a move back to France to coach.

The *Sydney Morning Herald* reported last week Cheika had been linked with second-division French club Beziers, with one source saying the move was all but "done deal".

Cheika said he had been to speaking to clubs and wanted to continue coaching.

"You have a few discussions with a few clubs," Cheika said. "I was over in Europe for the first part of the year and went back three or four times and spoke to a few teams. [I will] wait to see what the competitions come back with, when they're starting, what's happening with international footy, what the calendar looks like and then maybe make some plans from there.

"I'm still very ambitious around coaching and I think for the next thing I do I want to make sure I take my time to see what will fit for me. I've never done coaching just for a few. I've had my businesses and - I know this sounds corny - but never done it for the money. I've loved doing it and it's a great lifestyle. I love the ups and downs of the game."

The Wallabies won 34 of 68 tests when Cheika was in charge, with the last result being a 40-16 loss to England in last year's Rugby World Cup quarterfinals.

Klopp inspired by ABs

Football

Champion Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp has revealed how the All Blacks inspired him throughout his nearly two-decade career in charge.

Ahead of the newly-crowned Premier League champions' trip to Manchester City today, Klopp spoke of how New Zealand's premier sporting team shaped his coaching right from the start when taking over German club Mainz 05 in 2001.

Klopp said he adopted the All Blacks' mantra: "As long as you wear this shirt, less than 100 per cent is not allowed".

He watched a documentary on the All Blacks soon after taking over and was hooked.

"I was completely impressed by these big fellas and how they spoke about [the shirt]. At that time, the All Blacks were 100 per cent, by far the best rugby team in the world and it was a really impressive thing," Klopp told a press conference.

"[They were] all full amateurs, they worked as butchers, as builders and all that stuff, but these pretty impressive guys, they spoke about their past and what it meant to

them to play for this team.

"I'm sure I told this [story] already a few times, but in the last two minutes before the team bus arrived at the stadium, we always listen to the haka... it was pretty loud and impressive and it gave us just a little kick.

"They were the All Blacks and Mainz, the main colour is red, so we made ourselves the 'All Reds'. Nobody noticed that because we were a small club and a small team but for us it was big.

"That's how it started for that team, I don't know how much the influence was of that, but if you asked the players of that time they would say they really liked it and it gave us the chance, from a team nobody is

interested in, to become a team that at least we were really interested in. That helped us."

Klopp guided Mainz 05 to successive fourth placings in Germany's second tier, then in his third season in 2003-04 they finished third and earned promotion to the Bundesliga for the first time in the club's history.

After winning back to back titles with Borussia Dortmund, Klopp took the reins at Liverpool in 2015 and won the Champions League in 2019 then, last week, clinched the club's first Premier League title since 1990.

Jordie best fullback says Canes coach

He's said it before, Hurricanes coach Jason Holland, and yesterday he said it again: Jordie Barrett is "streets ahead" as best fullback in Super Rugby Aotearoa.

It's a bold statement with the likes of rising Crusaders star Will Jordan and Chiefs All Black Damian McKenzie filling the 15 jerseys at other franchises. And, most notably, a bloke named Beauden Barrett who returns to Wellington as fullback for the Blues tomorrow night.

After a false start in round one when Jordie Barrett was ruled out with a shoulder injury, the Battle of the Barretts is officially on at Sky Stadium (7.05pm) when the former World Rugby player of the year returns to face his old team.

Asked the question about his Barrett, the younger, Holland was only too happy to talk him up.

"A 100 per cent: in my eyes he's the best [fullback] in the country but he's got to work hard to make sure he stays there and perform week in, week out," Holland said.

Barrett, the 1.96m, 96kg youngest of the three All Black siblings at age 23, returned from a dislocated shoulder for their win over the Chiefs.

He'd started the year in fine style pre-lockdown, and despite a four-month rugby layoff showed enough touches of class to add weight to Holland's assessment.

His best moment of the victory over the Highlanders was his angled run to break Kobus van Wyk for the Hurricanes' second try.

Said Holland of last Sunday: "[There were] a couple of little sloppy bits there, and Jordie's come to me and talked around things that aren't his absolute standard around a couple of turnovers. But for me, he's streets ahead of everyone else at 15."

Which brings us to his older brother, still at 15 in coach Leon MacDonald's side with Otago Black - another former Hurricane - retaining the first five-eighth spot. The Blues are second on the ladder after suffering their first defeat to the Crusaders, and Barrett

hardly set the turf alight by his stellar standards in recent weeks after a lengthy post-World Cup break.

The Beauden Barrett 10 or 15 debate remains as hot as ever, after he was shifted to fullback by coach Steve Hansen last year and Richie Mo'unga handed the keys to the driver's seat. Barrett made his name at first-five for the Hurricanes and plenty of sage rugby watchers would like him back there for the Blues.

Holland announced four changes to his starting XV from their 17-11 win over the Highlanders, with All Blacks hooker Dane Coles (calf injury) the most notable returnee in a near enough to full strength side.

Santner a masked man

New Zealand cricketer Mitchell Santner is Caribbean-bound, suitcase packed with masks and protective gloves, his next four months in offshore Twenty20 league bubbles being mapped out with military precision.

Santner and eight others issued No Objection Certificates by New Zealand Cricket - including senior Black Cap Ross Taylor - are flying this week via the United States to Trinidad for the Caribbean Premier League starting on August 18.

Former skipper Brendon McCullum is also CPL-bound as coach of Trinbago Knight Riders, while the New Zealanders spread across the six teams are Santner, Taylor, Colin Munro, Tim Seifert, Glenn Phillips, Ish Sodhi, Corey Anderson, Scott Kuggeleijn and Nick Kelly.

Santner was scheduled to depart last night to join Barbados Tridents, then jet across to Dubai in September for the Indian Premier League which won't see him return until November for a fortnight of quarantine. The West Indies are tentatively scheduled to be the Black Caps' first home opponents in late November.

New Zealand's premier limited overs spin bowler said he "ummed and aahed" in recent weeks about travelling amid the Covid-19 pandemic but was reassured by CPL organisers.

"It's an interesting one. I'm going through America and I'll park up in the [airport] lounge in the corner somewhere. It's one of the risks we've got to think about," Santner said.

"They've put an extensive booklet together about what happens in each circumstance which has been good, and a bit of clarity around where we're staying. It seems like they've got it under control."

Santner had a Covid-19 test on Tuesday and will have another on arrival in Trinidad and Tobago which has recorded just 156 cases and shut its borders. It will permit players and officials via charter flights.

All six teams will stay in the same hotel and the 33 matches will be played at two venues with no crowds: the Queen's Park Oval and Brian Lara Cricket Academy. The final is scheduled for September 10.

Nine days later the Indian Premier League is scheduled to start in the United Arab Emirates, and run until November 10. Santner, contracted to coach Stephen Fleming's Chennai Super Kings, is the only Black Cap playing both T20 tournaments with Kane Williamson, Trent Boult, Lockie Ferguson and Jimmy Neesham also IPL-bound.

"At this stage we'll just fly straight across [from the Caribbean]. I'm not sure what quarantine looks like yet, but there's some other big dogs like Dwayne Bravo and Brendon McCullum I can tag along with."

Santner said. In the CPL Santner will play under West Indies coach Phil Simmons and captain Jason Holder, and alongside Rashid Khan, the world's best legspinner.

The left-arm is looking forward to bowling in tandem with Rashid, and to a couple of Hamilton-based team-mates in Taylor and Seifert. "I'm used to bowling in the nets to them and they've been running down at every ball so it'd be nice to play some of these guys on some spinning wickets and see if they want to try that again," he quipped.

For Santner it's been a while, since the March 13 ODI in Sydney when the Black Caps were summoned home and into a fortnight of self-isolation. Post-lockdown, they've been worked hard by Black Caps strength and conditioning coach Chris Donaldson.

"It'll be exciting to play some cricket again. It's been a slow winter but good to be at home for a bit and train and do all the fitness work. Chris put us through the wringer the last six weeks so it's nice to go away and not see him for a few months." NZC issued NOCs to all players who requested them for CPL and IPL, on the proviso they pay for quarantine on return, if required.

NZC said it recognises the right of contracted players to make their own decisions around availability for overseas domestic leagues, where these do not impact on NZC playing schedules. "We work alongside the players and the NZCPA to ensure they receive the appropriate information around health and safety, and current practices involving departures and return from New Zealand ports, including quarantine procedures upon arrival."

Fisheries New Zealand is responsible for administering the Fisheries Act 1996 and regulations made under that Act. Fisheries New Zealand is seeking public comment on a package of fishing method prohibitions and restrictions proposed for areas along the south-east coast of the South Island.

The alphanumeric identifier at the end of each name in brackets is to assist referencing the Forum's Recommendations Report.

- **Tuhawaiki (A1):** Prohibition on bottom trawling, dredging, Danish seining, set netting, mid-water trawling and commercial long lining; and a five hook limit for line fishing.
- **Moko-tere-a-torehu (C1):** Prohibition on bottom trawling, dredging, Danish seining, set netting and mid-water trawling.
- **Kaimata (E1):** Prohibition on bottom trawling, dredging, Danish seining, set netting, mid-water trawling and purse seining.
- **Whakatorea Estuary (L1) and Tahakopa Estuary (Q1):** Prohibition on dredging, set netting, commercial line fishing, mechanical harvesting (including spades for collecting shellfish) and fyke net fishing.
- **Arai Te Uru (T1):** Prohibition on commercial harvesting of bladder kelp (*Macrocystis pyrifera*).

The primary purpose of these proposals is to manage adverse effects of fishing on the marine environment. The proposals also contribute towards meeting the objectives of the Marine Protected Areas Policy and Implementation Plan, and New Zealand's obligations under the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity.

In May 2019, the Ministers of Conservation and Fisheries announced that statutory processes would begin to establish six marine reserves under the Marine Reserves Act 1971 and five Type 2 marine protected areas and a kelp harvesting prohibition area under the Fisheries Act 1996. Together, these would create marine protected areas on the southeastern coast of the South Island similar to network 1 as recommended by the South-East Marine Protection Forum Roopu Manaaki ki te Toka. The identification system used by the forum (e.g. B1) alongside the proposed name of each marine reserve is provided below.

Pursuant to section 5 of the Marine Reserves Act 1971 and section 48 of the Marine and Coastal Area (Takutai Moana) Act 2011, the Director-General of Conservation hereby gives notice of his intention to apply for an Order in Council declaring marine reserves in six areas of sea and foreshore in the southeast South Island, with their proposed names, as follows:

1. **Waitaki Marine Reserve (B1):** The proposed marine reserve boundary starts approximately 2 km south of the Waitaki River mouth and extends south for 14.8 km (8 NM). The site includes the coastal marine area from MHWS and extends offshore 8 km (4.3 NM). Area: 101.3 km².
2. **Te Umu Koau Marine Reserve (D1):** The proposed marine reserve boundary starts approximately 100 m north of the mouth of Stony Creek and extends south to a point approximately 400 m south of the mouth of Pleasant River. It includes Bobbys Head and the entirety of Stony Creek and Pleasant River estuaries. The reserve extends from MHWS to a straight line outer boundary that ranges between 10 km and 12 km offshore. Area: 96 km².
3. **Papanui Marine Reserve (H1):** The proposed marine reserve boundary starts approximately 6 km out from Cape Saunders and extends north approximately 11 km. It then extends to the 12 NM territorial sea limit, incorporating Papanui Canyon. Area: 167 km².
4. **Ōrau Marine Reserve (I1):** The proposed marine reserve boundary extends from Harakeke Point on the Otago Peninsula 17.8 km to the outer point of Saint Clair. It includes Lawyers Head, Māori Head, Seal Point and the waters surrounding Gull Rocks from MHWS. The seaward boundary extends from Harakeke Point to approximately 1 km to the south of the breaking reef to the west of Pōnuahine (White Island). The area does not include Tow Rock. Area: 28.8 km².
5. **Okaihae Marine Reserve (K1):** The proposed marine reserve encompasses Okaihae/Green Island, extending approximately 1 km to the north, west and east of the island, and 1.3 km to the south. Area: 5 km².
6. **Hākinikini Marine Reserve (M1):** The proposed marine reserve boundary begins approximately 0.8 km north of the entrance to Akatore Creek and extends south along the coastline for approximately 6.5 km to the northern point of Watsons Beach. It extends from MHWS to approximately 0.6 to 1.3 km offshore. Area: 5.9 km².

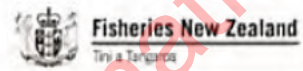
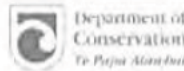
